Rhoten started the display in the 1980s at a different house because he and his family would all travel around the city looking at Christmas lights when he was younger. The display, which has grown immensely over the years, is meant to give back to the community and make people smile, if only for a moment.

"This is a small way of giving back, a chance to make people smile no matter what is going on in their lives," explained Rhoten. "When (people) come by, I see a lot of smiles and all is good for a few minutes.

"This has been a very hard year on everyone, and I hope for at least a few minutes in December each night, I made it a little better."

Karen Tunnell, the general manager of Kingsport Speedway, described what propelled this house to the winner's circle.

"It was not an easy task for our judges," said Tunnell. "They had a tough time picking a winner because there were so many top contenders in the contest.

"The Rhoten house was hard to beat in the end with its decorations all around, donation box for the local animal shelter, and Mr. Rhoten's goal to make someone's night special. We hope Bill enjoys this award as a token of our appreciation for spreading Christmas cheer in the area."

Tunnell said the contest went over well, especially since it was dreamed up last-minute.
